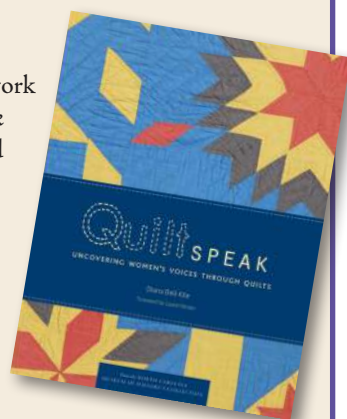

## Carnatic Veena, Featuring Gowri Srinivas, Sudhindra Rao, and Samarth Rao

The *veena* belongs to a family of ancient stringed instruments with many variations, but the design used in the classical Carnatic music common to southern India, and used by Srinivas, resembles a long-necked, pear-shaped lute. She is joined today by Sudhindra Rao, a seasoned musician from a long and illustrious family of musicians, and his son, Samarth, currently a high school sophomore in Raleigh.
